There was no newsletter in January, so you haven't missed anything. Bonnie and I were away for a few weeks, to try to escape some of the winter weather bedeviling the central and eastern parts of the country. In fact, it's another snowy day here as I write, and much of the East Coast is caught up in yet another spate of cold, wind and snow. Bonnie & I narrowly escaped the 30-inch blizzard that hit the DC area and mid-Atlantic a few weeks ago. We jumped in our car and headed south the day before the storm hit. Unfortunately, we didn't go far enough, as the southern edge of the storm caught up with us in Asheville, NC, dumping only eight inches of snow, but enough to strand us in a hotel for two days. When the roads cleared, we were pleased to meet up with GSS veterans, Bob and Bev Millians, in Athens, GA, and we had a nice visit with them. Continuing south from there, we spent a couple of weeks meandering about in central Florida, which was only slightly warmer than home. The highlight of the trip for me was a couple of days in the Cocoa Beach area, where we took in an all-day visit to the Kennedy Space Center at Cape Canaveral. This probably won't much impress the veterans of Det 4 or the current NGA Geodetic Support Team, who spent much of their time up close and personal, supporting historic launches during the Mercury, Gemini, Apollo, and Space Shuttle programs and other launches, but I was as thrilled as a school boy among the historic rockets on display, the ride to the Vehicle Assembly Building and the visit to the historic launch pads 39A and 39B! A great place to visit when you are in Florida!

More on the History of LS-85

As you are aware from recent newsletters, I have been collaborating with **Gordon Barnes** (Acting GSS Commander and Deputy Commander for Operations, FEW, 1975-78) and **Julian Higgins** (Computations, FEW, 1968-69; Sat Tri, FEW, 1975-76; Commander, Det 1, 1977-80) on a history of the accomplishments of the Photomapping Wing and the GSS during the Vietnam era, particularly with respect to the ill-fated Combat Skyspot operations at Lima Site 85 (LS-85) on Phou Pha Thi Mountain in Laos. For those who don't know, Combat Skyspot was the name given to special radar operations that guided the B-52s and other tactical air support on bombing runs in Vietnam. LS-85 was a highly classified Skyspot installation in Laos, nominally a neutral country, which was intended to improve the radar support for areas inside North Vietnam. LS-85 was ill-fated because it was over-run by the North Vietnamese only a few months after becoming operational leading to the single worst loss of Air force personnel during the Vietnam War. A total of 12 U.S. personnel were missing or killed in the fighting on Phou Pha Thi; 11 were killed or missing on the ground and one was shot dead during the evacuation. The single fatality occurring during the evacuation was CMSgt **Richard Etchberger** of the 1st Combat Evaluation Group (1st CEG), who was awarded the Medal of Honor posthumously in September 2010 for his role in helping four injured airmen into the evacuation helicopter lift sling. Etchberger was mortally wounded as he was climbing into the evacuation helicopter. For details, see: https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Battle_of_Lima_Site_85.

The Photomapping Wing had completed an aerial HIRAN survey in late 1967 to establish the position of LS-85, and that required support of ground surveys. Julian had recovered two geodetic control points in Thailand near Udorn AB, but needed ground survey support for astro-azimuth and astro-positioning. While doing the research for the article, we were not certain which organization provided the geodetic and astronomic observations on the ground, 1381st GSS or 1st CEG, which already had surveyors and computers on the ground supporting Skyspot activities in Vietnam. Many of our GSS veteran surveyors and computers are also veterans of 1st CEG. That mystery has now been cleared up, thanks to input received, first, from CMSgt **Larry Hootman** (Survey, Sat Tri; Orlando, FEW & Det #1; 1960-85) and most recently from SMSgt **Connie Musha** (Survey, Gravity and IPS: Orlando, 1959-62; FEW, 1975-77). Connie recently sent the note below.

edited for clarity:

In May 1967 myself, **Dick Mass**etti & **Kip Nissen** were deployed from Barksdale AFB, LA. (HQ 1CEG) to Thailand & Vietnam to survey a SKYSPOT ground directed bombing site (Site 85, Laos). After doing the recon on several of the potential geodetic control stations using Helicopters, we discovered that the mountain tops had been leveled off and the natives had turned them into small villages. [We tried] to land on one mountain, when the Chopper blade struck the side of the mountain and crashed. No one was hurt.

After this accident, the Colonel in charge recommended to our Hqs to task the Photomapping Wing to perform the survey using HIRAN Trilateration.

The Photo Wing deployed 3 HIRAN Sites. One was on Udorn AB, Thailand; one was at Site 85; and I can't remember where the third was located. Ben Billings and Larry Hootman (GSS) performed the observations for the astro position and azimuth.

My Survey Team remained there until around first of October, after the site [LS-85] was validated. Five months later the site was over-run by the North Vietnamese. Eleven members of our outfit were killed or MIA. One member [CMSgt Etchberger] made it to the rescue chopper, but died a little later. He was later awarded the Medal of Honor.

This project at the time of construction was highly classified, but later, after the war, it was publicized on TV and all the newspapers. Also the AFTERBURNER has the story of the MOH Award.

A series of e-mail exchanges with Larry Hootman also provided the details we needed to complete the story. I also added a related story about the move of one Skyspot radar to Mukdahan, Thailand, in late 1968. I was NCOIC of the first geodetic survey team deployed by the GSS to Thailand to complete nav-aid surveys at all the air bases being used in Thailand. We were there from August to December 1968, and the survey at Mukdahan came as a surprise near the end of our stay. It turned out to be a great personal adventure for me. The team members were the late 1st Lt Roy Herbst (OIC), myself (NCOIC), Sgt Jim Peek, Sgt Roger Poe, the late Sgt Ken Havasi, the late Sgt Herb Matson (Astro), and the late GSS civilian Charlie Cramer (Astro). Deceased Members Update

We were saddened to learn of the passing of **Richard K. Burkard**, Lt Col, USAF, Ret., this past Christmas Eve. Although Dick was not a member of our Squadron, he was a member of one of our sister squadrons, the 1375th Mapping & Charting Squadron, under the 1370th Photomapping Wing. We made Dick an honorary member a few years ago, when he got us back in touch with one of the original members of the 1381st in Orlando, **Chuck Finley**. (As you may recall, Chuck attended our last reunion in Cheyenne with his family and was honored for being a GSS pioneer.) However, the main reason to make Dick Burkard an honorary member was his writing of a seminal booklet in geodesy on which every geodetic surveyor and anyone else associated with the world of Mapping, Charting and Geodesy, cut his or her eye teeth----*Geodesy for the Layman*. Dick's publication of this paperback pamphlet broke down a difficult and complex topic and made it much easier to understand. After 50+ years since original publication, it has gone through several updates as geodetic technology changed, but the latest version is still available at this link: http://earth-info.nga.mil/GandG/publications/geolay/toc.html
