A few days ago, we were pleased to hear from **Mike Szyhowski** (Survey & Gravity, FEW, 1972-73; Survey,1973-78; Techniques, Operations, FEW, 1979-81). He said that he finally tracked down another GSS veteran he has been trying to find for a long time. Says Mike:

"Hi Garrett!

I managed to locate former squadron member **Bobby J. Laymon**. I first met Bobby in 1971 when he came to Howard AFB, Canal Zone. Along with **Bill Barron** and then **Bill DeCostanza** we were the surveyor contingent responsible for operating the bombing range (Balboa West) in the Canal Zone interior. I headed to Cheyenne in March 72 and Bobby followed several months later. Located Bobby at the Lackland AFB Chapel, where he is an almost daily volunteer. Bobby and I spoke yesterday and caught up on our lives. He is 78 now and a retired SMSgt. Following his GSS tour, he cross-trained to Safety, and spent another 14 years in that field. He even had a second tour in Panama.

I spent 30 yrs. in education teaching math and science and being an elementary principal. It came from **Boe Borchardt**, but the information was not really relevant to Blackie's specific request. To repeat, in case you missed it last time:

"Garrett - Some years after I left the Philippine Islands (1952) I saw a photo of the monument erected at Cavite and a listing of personnel who had lost their lives while serving in the 29th named on the monument. I wonder whether anybody still has that material and, if so, would they share it with me. I surfed the net and found nothing and I don't know where to ask in Belvoir or DC. Seems like there were 29 names on it. Thought maybe you might be of help to me. ...". - Walt (Blackie) Blackmer."

"My time with DMA was a relatively brief but life changing couple of years beginning in 1981. The "trouble" began when I received a flyer describing career opportunities with the Geodetic Survey Squadron. I received it from one of my surveying professors at Penn State Univ, who had met with GSS technical director **Burt Sharpe** to tell him about the PSU survey program. According to the Prof, Burt told him he would like to hire every one of the qualified graduates and gave him a supply of these flyers to distribute. I'd never heard of this outfit but it sounded like just what I was looking for, probably even more interesting than anything I could have imagined. So I mailed in my application, interviewed, graduated, got the job, and was soon on my way to a series of great adventures working with the finest people and equipment in the world. The experience and training I received at GSS enabled me to soon land a job at NOAA's National Geodetic Survey. At NGS I began by doing fieldwork and outreach in their "mark maintenance" program which was soon converted to the State Advisor and then Regional Advisor Programs. I did that for the next 30+ years 'til I retired from NGS in 2017, all in all a very rewarding career!

I don't have many photos from my time at GSS; wish I had more, and none of them in digital form. Now that I'm retired, I may find time to look through them and see if any are worth scanning, then send them along. I've been receiving your GSS Newsletters for a few years now and occasionally browsing your website archives. Thank you for the effort you, Dick Winslow and others put into this ... greatly appreciated!" - David Conner

As of today, I have no information about funeral arrangements or an obituary, but we will include them in the net newsletter.
